President's Message

"Make no little plans" was the recommendation of Daniel Burnham, and the Village Board of Trustees agree with him. The Trustees recently embarked upon a project that will result in the replacement of the main water line throughout the east side of town. The funds that the Village is receiving from the various Federal and State programs will be the seed money for this ambitious undertaking. The entire project will cost somewhere in the 3-to-4-million-dollar range. It is the intention of the Village to seek a loan with an interest rate of approximately 1.11% to finance the entire project.

A good review of the project is in the description as found in the agreement with the engineers:

"The improvement consists of the construction of a new replacement water main along portions of Winmoor Drive, Locust Drive, Hillcrest Parkway, Hillcrest Drive, Thorobred Lane, Walnut Drive, and extension of water main along Laurel Court, Elm Court and Rainbow Drive.

The improvement will include the replacement of existing water main, extension of water main, the re-connection of water service to the new main, the installation of new valves and fire hydrants, the service connection of residents not on Village water for portions of extension, and other appurtenant construction. The length of these water main replacement and extension is approximately 20,000 lineal feet."

VEHICLE STICKERS AND ANIMAL TAGS DUE



The deadline to purchase vehicle stickers and animal tags is April 30th. Late fees are applied starting on May 1st, by the doubling of the normal registration fee with an additional \$5/month charge for each 30 days past due. The Village of Sleepy Hollow requires all vehicles registered to a Sleepy Hollow address (including leased vehicles) to display, on a yearly basis, a windshield vehicle sticker, motorcycle tag or trailer tag (Ord Title 5, Chapter 2, Section 2). Senior citizens and active military are eligible for a 10% discount.

MOTORIST REMINDERS

Our days are getting longer, temps are getting more tolerable, and we continue to grind our way through winter and towards spring. After a short hiatus, the criminals trying to steal items from parked vehicles and in some cases actually stealing the vehicle, have returned to Sleepy Hollow. Although our Village is tucked away amongst the trees, we need to stay vigilant and limit the opportunities for criminal activity.

Please remember to keep your vehicles locked while parked outside your home and remove any valuables. Most of these criminals are opportunistic and while we cannot control their desire to commit crimes, we can control their abilities to be successful. In almost every case, the criminals are accessing vehicles that have been left unlocked. Remember to Lock it or Lose it.



Pedestrian Safety

As motorists, we have an obligation to yield to bicyclists and pedestrians. They always have the right of way, and our lack of sidewalks puts them in harm's way by forcing them to share our roadways. Please be considerate, and slow down, and give a wide berth when passing pedestrians.

This year, our Village will be adding additional caution signs and updating speed limit signs. We are also working with our citizen partners in the Village to develop a comprehensive traffic safety program to provide for the long-term safety of our citizens, their children and their pets.

Integral parts of any traffic safety program are education and enforcement. Education is fun, enforcement.....not so much.

Let me add an observation about enforcement. Contrary to what some think, police officers do not enjoy writing tickets. It is, however, a necessary tool for our officers to use in order to assure roadway safety.



With the exception of our perimeter roads, all our interior roads have 25mph speed limits. Remember, a speed limit is not a suggestion, it is the upper limit that a driver is allowed to travel (assuming ideal driving conditions). To illustrate, a driver going 28mph on Sleepy Hollow Road is speeding and could be issued a traffic citation.

I have always dreamed of the time when my officers come to me and tell me that they searched far and wide for a speeding motorist, but none could be found. That hasn't happened yet so please help my dreams come true!

Warmer weather will be here before you know it. I hope everyone has a safe and enjoyable spring. The men and women of the Sleepy Hollow Police Department stand ready to keep our town safe and secure.

WILDFLOWERS OF SPRINGTIME

One of the joys of spring is the reappearance of wildflowers, in particular, those early woodland flowers often referred to as spring ephemerals. Most are perennials and, as their name implies, these plants emerge before most trees and bushes leaf out, then flower and are generally gone by June or early July when they go dormant. In rich woodlands (absent invasive brush such as autumn olive and honeysuckle that can shade out understory vegetation), spring ephemerals may carpet the ground in color. Most of these flowers rely on native bees for pollination, although the nectar may also attract various fly species. In fact, healthy native bee populations rely on pollen and nectar provided by spring ephemerals. Interestingly, most spring ephemerals rely on ants to disperse their seeds. These seeds each have a structure called an elaiosome on the surface that is a nutritious food source for the ants, which collect the seeds and carry them to their nests. Once done feeding on the elaiosome, the ants dispose of the seed outside the nest in a waste pile where they can germinate. Isn't nature cleverly complex! So, here are a few species one may encounter in our area woodlands this spring.

One of the most arresting spring ephemerals is the large white trillium (*Trillium grandiflorum*) which can grow up to 2 feet tall. In full bloom during May, it may cover the ground in woodland habitats. Another relatively common trillium in our area is the prairie trillium (*T. recurvatum*). It is about 6-12 inches tall with dark maroon petals and can be found from mid-April to mid-June. While there are several trillium species, these are probably the two locally common in our area.



Bloodroot (*Sanguinaria canadensis*) is one of the earliest woodland flowers, breaking through the soil surface as soon as the frost is gone in March. The flower and a single leaf stem arise separately, with the deeply-clefted leaf wrapped around the flower stem. The white flower with a yellow center may reach 10 inches in height but only last for a day or two. The plant roots and stems have an acrid, reddish sap, hence the name.

A unique spring flower that looks like a tiny pair of pantaloons is called Dutchman's breeches (*Dicentra cucullaria*). This plant with its lacy-cut leaves grows to less than a foot in height and the flowers are adapted for early bumblebee pollination. Dutchman's breeches may grow as an expanding colony.



Shooting stars (*Dodecatheon meadia*) have white to pink downward-facing flowers that grow on a long stalk from a basal rosette of leaves. The flower stalk may be as tall as 12 to 24 inches. As these nodding flowers have no nectar, only native bees service this plant.

If you see a blue hue covering the ground in a woodland, you are likely looking at an understory of Virginia bluebells (*Mertensia virginica*). This plant often appears in dense groupings with clusters of bell-shaped blue flowers that can create a spectacular show. Bluebells have soft-green foliage, stand up to 2-foot tall and spread easily.



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MORE WILDFLOWERS OF SPRINGTIME

Bellwort (*Uvularia grandiflora*) is an interesting, arching lily with a yellow flower. The nodding bell-like flower and stem are encircled by the leaves, giving the impression that the plant is drooping and in need of moisture. The bloom only lasts for about 2 weeks.



Trout lilies, early spring bloomers that disappear by July, can be either yellow (*Erythronium americanum*) or white (*E. albidum*). The name comes from the speckled, elongated leaves which have the shape and spot pattern of the brown or brook trout. The plant grows only to about 6 inches in height.



A spring plant that does not depend on bees for pollination is the jack-in-the-pulpit (*Arisaema atrorubens* or *A. triphyllum*). Furthermore, this unique plant is dioicous (i.e., the sexes are on separate plants) and pollination requires the services of a fungus gnat searching for a place to lay its eggs. The gnat is attracted to the male plant by odor where it picks up pollen, escapes and carries it to the female plant. The gnat enters the female "pulpit" or spathe, carrying the pollen

needed to fertilize the jack-in-the-pulpit seeds. It is difficult to escape the female spathe, and the gnat is often trapped along with other flies and beetles. In midsummer, the mature seeds are a striking scarlet. Small mammals and birds distribute these seeds.



Habitat loss and invasive plants have reduced spring ephemeral populations. However, all these plants can do well in our gardens and would benefit our native bee populations. It is recommended that these plants be purchased from garden nurseries that cultivate native species and do not use chemical insecticides, especially neonicotinoids. Three reputable nurseries include: Pizzo Native Plant Nursery, Leland, IL; Natural Garden Natives, St. Charles, IL; and Prairie Nursery, Westfield, WI.



Warmer weather helps us look forward to spending time outdoors, challenging us to “get fit” for summer activities like swimming, softball/baseball games, hiking, golfing, and biking. Before beginning a fitness program, the medical community recommends a visit to your doctor for a complete physical. Likewise, warmer weather is the opportune time to give your property its annual “physical exam” and start a program to keep your property fit—thus keeping your property and your neighborhood in good health.

Here are some questions to help you conduct the “physical exam” of your property:

- ✓ Is the property in a clean, sanitary and safe condition?
- ✓ Are sidewalks, walkways, stairs, driveways, parking spaces and similar areas free from hazardous conditions and in good repair?
- ✓ Is any grass-type ground cover being maintained at eight inches (8”) or less?
- ✓ Are all exterior areas of the property and premises (and interior of every structure) free from any accumulation of rubbish or garbage?
- ✓ Are all accessory structures including pools, decks, fences, and walls, structurally sound and in good repair?
- ✓ If you have a swimming pool—does it have the proper, required fence; is the fence in good repair; and is the swimming pool itself, in a clean, sanitary condition and in good repair?
- ✓ Are the pool fence’s gates self-closing and self-latching mechanisms maintained so that the gate will positively close and latch when released from a still position of 6 inches from the gatepost?
- ✓ Are any unlicensed vehicles properly stored in a garage?
- ✓ Are all licensed vehicles properly parked in the driveway and off the grass?
- ✓ Is the exterior of your structure in good repair—structurally sound and sanitary?
 - Are all exterior surfaces, including doors, door and window frames, cornices, porches, trim, balconies, decks, and pool/patio/dog run fences in good condition?
 - Are all exterior wood surfaces—other than those built of decay-resistant materials—protected from the weather and decay with paint or other protective covering or treatment covering all surfaces? (Peeling, flaking, or chipped paint will need to be eliminated and surfaces refinished.)
 - Are windows and joints properly caulked to maintain weather-resistant, watertight seals?
 - Is the roof and flashing sound, tight, and not have any defects that admit rain?
 - Are roof drains, gutters and downspouts in good repair and free of obstructions? Are downspouts properly located so they don’t drain onto the neighboring properties, sidewalks, or driveway?
 - Are all exterior stairs, decks, porches, and balconies, maintained so as to be structurally sound and safe and in good repair?
 - Are all handrails or guardrails maintained in good repair—securely fastened and capable of supporting adults?
 - Do you have the required screens on your openable windows? Are the screens tight-fitting and of not less than 16 mesh per inch?
- ✓ Are your address numbers properly displayed on your home so they’re plainly legible and visible from the street in front of your property (Arabic numerals or alphabet letters, a minimum of 4” high and one-half inch (1/2”) stroke that contrast with the background)? Numbers are required on the house itself, because numbers on mailboxes can become dislodged, covered, or unreadable, and emergency personnel must be able to clearly identify a property.

A FRIENDLY REMINDER

THE VILLAGE OF SLEEPY HOLLOW REQUIRES PERMITS FOR (not a complete list):

- ☞ Replacing a roof surface
- ☞ Replacing/installing a water heater
- ☞ Installing a central air conditioning system or furnace
- ☞ Installing or replacing a deck/porch
- ☞ "Screening in" a deck
- ☞ Adding a pergola/gazebo to a deck
- ☞ A swimming pool (water depth of more than 24")
- ☞ Any additions
- ☞ Upgrading electrical service, adding switches or receptacles
- ☞ Changing/adding plumbing lines
- ☞ Finishing/remodeling a basement
- ☞ Patio, pool, dog run fences
- ☞ Patios, driveways, sidewalks
- ☞ Porticos

BYE-BYE, WINDSOR DRIVE?

Windsor Drive, one of the last remaining "road stubs" in Sleepy Hollow may soon be sold off. Like the other stubs, Windsor Drive is visible as a small street on maps and platted as a right-of-way, although the Village has abandoned it. It presently is a tree-lined grass area. Windsor Drive which would have connected Randall Road to Deer Lane, was supposed to serve as the main entrance for the Deer Creek subdivision. However, Kane County and the department of transportation had concerns about having three residential access points in close proximity along Randall Road. Ultimately, it was decided that the Deer Creek subdivision would not get its own dedicated entrance. Rather, the Deer Creek subdivision would be served by the existing two Randall Road access points (Joy and Saddle Club). The Village of Sleepy Hollow has sold other road stubs in recent years, and does so when residents abutting the road stub express interest in purchase, or a home renovation isn't possible due to encroachment of the right-of-way.



CHANGES TO P&Z COMMITTEE

Sleepy Hollow Planning & Zoning Committee chairman Dirk Fuqua recently passed away. His tenure with the village was lengthy, extensive, and unselfish. He will be missed. Longtime resident Don Plass has been appointed to fill the vacancy left behind by Mr. Fuqua's passing. Additionally, Eric Waters and Kevin Erickson have been appointed to serve as members of the committee.

EARTH DAY CLEANUP

All are welcome to come help beautify the Village's roadways. The annual Earth Day cleanup will take place on April 23rd. Meet in the Village Hall parking lot at 9 am. CONGRATS TO OUR OWN



Yardwaste pickup resumes the first week in April. Please place yardwaste in paper yardwaste bags weighing up to 50 pounds or in 32-gallon trash cans clearly labeled “Yardwaste Only”. Branches and limbs have a maximum length of 3 feet. Curbside yardwaste gets processed at a local composting facility. The yardwaste collected helps to divert methane emissions from landfills, recapture useful nutrients, and ultimately enriches soil.
